

Conditions of Military Airworthiness Authority Recognition:

1. The French State Aviation Safety Authority (DSAE) sovereign authorities and responsibilities are not abdicated by this recognition.
2. The Australian Defence Aviation Safety Authority (DASA) remains compliant with the safety goals as described in the Military Authority Recognition Question set.
3. DASA's conduct of regulatory assurance is assessed as being at a standard by which the continuing airworthiness artefacts can be accepted by DSAE as described in the table here below.

Artefacts	Remarks
Approvals of maintenance or training organisations, and military aviation maintenance licences delivered by DASA can be accepted by the DSAE.	Approvals and licensing based on DASR part 66 & 147, DASR part 145 & DASR part M.
Audits and surveillance for the approvals of maintenance and training organisations may be conducted jointly.	Development of the process for conducting joint audits and surveillance is required.

4. Where practicable, DASA will keep the DSAE informed of significant changes to airworthiness organisation, regulations or procedures.
5. Where release is permissible, DASA will inform the DSAE of significant aircraft accidents or incidents involving systems common to the French State and the Australian Defence Force, and for relevant safety information to be shared.
6. Where release is permissible, DASA will inform the DSAE of significant safety or quality concerns arising from the performance of any approved organisations which may be providing services or products to the Australian Defence Force.
7. The recognition of DASA is in effect for four years from the date of this certificate unless amended or revoked. A review of the recognition would be carried out prior to expiration and be renewed if the review is successful.
